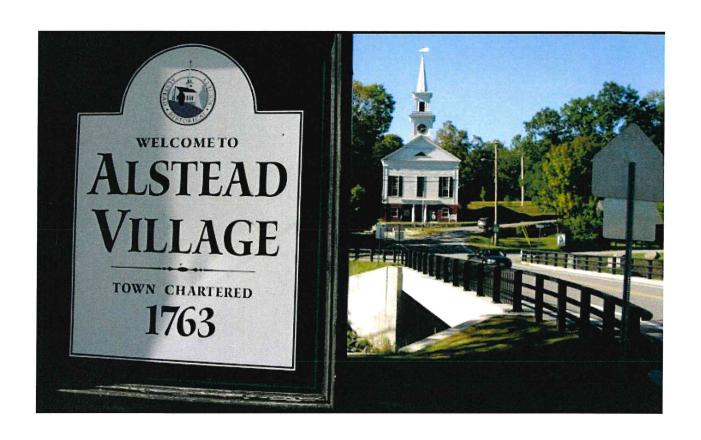

Peg Sutcliffe and her husband Sam didn't like the high taxes in Ashby, Massachusetts where they had lived for many years prior to Sam's retirement in 1995. It didn't take long for them to find a historic home in Alstead. They moved and began restoring it to its original glory.

Among many interesting finds was stenciling by the now famous Moses Eaton Jr. in two of the bedrooms. She and Sam worked diligently to research their home and ultimately were able to have the house listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Peg earned a BA in Fine Applied Arts from the University of Illinois, becoming proficient and highly creative in many mediums, including quilting, oil and watercolor painting, egg tempera, and silverpoint, as well as theatrical set design. She is fondly remembered for her Christmas cards and looked forward to designing them every year.

First as a member, and then as a Board Member of the Alstead Historical Society, Peg was highly active in the organization. As editor and one of the major contributors to the Alstead Vintage Times, she is recognized for the scope and depth of her articles. In addition, she and Sam contributed much time and energy to the Alstead Sesquicentennial in 2013, designing and making a quilt for raffle. This quilt is now displayed in the historical society's museum.

As an active member of the Langdon Covered Bridge association, Peg helped with many fundraising events, including compiling the covered bridge cookbook and participating in the yearly covered bridge festival.

Peg was a trustee of the First Congregational Church, and a stalwart member of the Third Congregational Church in Alstead.

She touched everyone with her generosity, wit, and good humor.

She is sorely missed.

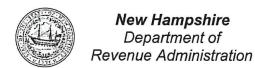

Selectmen's Letter

It's been a kind of 'good news and bad news' year for the Town.

In the good news department, we experienced an explosion of civic service and young energy in the 10 yr old person of Luke Druschel. Millot Green now has a well-tricked out skating rink again! The Selectboard managed to stay out of the way (beyond resolving any insurance/liability issues in advance), while Luke used modern tools like GoFundMe and YouTube to raise a lot of money and volunteer commitments. Griffin Construction and Liberty Utilities chipped in with amenities. Day or night you are more than likely to see a few skaters twirling and swooping around. There's a box of loaner skates, so you too can take a spin.

In the bad news department, we experienced a kind of explosion in the engine of our new second-hand ambulance. Two months out of warranty we had a sudden failure attributed to a design flaw in the valve train.

In the good news department, we received a free loaner ambulance for the duration of the repair from the firm that sold us the now broken rig, and we got a lot of sympathy, support, and service from Shamrock Motors. More astonishingly, we received, unsolicited and unheralded, two private donations to the tune of \$15k towards the new motor. ARPA funds will cover the balance, so no Alstead tax dollars are at work here; our good fortune.

In the bad news arena, we are experiencing what the engineers call 'infrastructure deficits' in our bridges, roads, and dams.

The good news is that we are receiving significant levels of technical and financial support from the State of NH (DOT, DES and the Dam Bureau), the Federal Infrastructure Act, FEMA, and a passel of private engineering firms. It will take *years* for all this to sugar off, but we're up and running.

Bridges: It sure doesn't look like it, but work (engineering, design, environmental, Right of Way and permitting) proceeds mostly on schedule, and absolutely on budget, on Hill Road and Comstock Road. We will go out to bid on about 5/15/25 for Hill Road, and maybe 12/15/25 for Comstock Road. Construction will begin in the Fall, and continue through the Winter ('25) and

Spring and likely Summer ('26). Hill Road will remain closed at Bell Hill until that bridge is open, and then we will close Comstock Road. Under no circumstances will both of those roads be closed at the same time. It should be celebrated that the Infrastructure Act will pay for 100% of the construction costs, and 80% of the design costs. It is impossible to imagine where we would find the money for these projects were we on our own. Because of your willingness to put money aside in Capital Reserves for big ticket items, and because of generous State and Federal support, no new taxes have been or will be raised for these bridges!

Other Bridges: Drewsville Road (at Hill Road) and Thayer Brook Road projects are less generously, but still significantly supported by the Feds and State. FEMA will almost certainly foot the bill to replace the Thayer Brook Road 'Bypass' with a new bridge via their Hazard Mitigation Program - this has been an enormous paper chase for Prescott and Tina, and is a long way from complete. Drewsville Road was enrolled a dozen years ago in the State's Bridge Aid Program which funds a few municipal bridge replacements every year at 80%. Our lucky year for this bridge will likely be 2027, though we can start up the design phase in 2026, if the votes are there to fund it.

Roads: None of us has been able to ignore the damage to 123A/Acworth Road by Vilas Pool Park in 2021, 2023 (and let's not forget 2005). NH DOT has an extensive and expensive plan for a more robust and permanent fix than the band-aids we have been applying over the decades. They are negotiating with FEMA for funding, and expect success. For us there is no local tax impact, but we will all be inconvenienced and discombobulated by a month or longer road closure in Summer 2026.

More Roads: We are falling further behind in our paving cycle, as we diverted what we would normally budget for paving to bridges - though the good news is that 100% of that expense will be reimbursed in 2025 and 2026. Perhaps we will have the will and the means to catch up and maybe even get ahead in years to come. The American Rescue Plan bought us a whole year's worth of culverts, for which we're grateful. That program is over, so we're back on our own again. The Fuzzy Brothers and Garland's Pit continue to treat us exceedingly well on vast volumes of sand and gravel, for which we're also grateful.

Dams: There's not a lot of good news in dam world; both of our Town-owned dams (Vilas and Warren) are under regulatory sanction as a consequence of their slow deterioration, changes in

the weather over the decades, and new standards for downstream life and property protection. Neither dam presents a failure threat in the short term, except in the face of statistically quite remote extreme weather events. There is a FEMA-administered grant program that specifically targets this kind of work, and the firm we're working with suggests that there is a very good chance we will be able to qualify for 65% of the costs for one, possibly both, of these projects. We're thinking 2028. We're thinking +/- \$2,000,000 by then. We have an excellent local grantwriter poised to engage.

It must be said that the current turmoil in DC has us all anxious about funding for current and future projects - though we will press on. We also imagine that tariffs on steel and rising inflation would have a significant, perhaps crippling, price impact upon all of the projects outlined above. We will get our first hard look at any of this bad news mid Summer this year, and see where we need to go from there.

The Future: In 2024 we saw 7 marriages, 8 new babies, and 10 residents passing on. In a nutshell, these numbers mirror our continuing loss of population (-3.8%, 2010–2020). This of course puts ever more pressure on the already precarious state of our school funding system, while the Legislature seems to be pulling back on support of various kinds. The discussions and brainstorming continue apace, but no magic bean has presented itself as of this date.

This is the year we acknowledge the 20th(!) anniversary of the Flood of 2005. Most of us who survived the event and recovery learned some powerful lessons about how to work with neighbors and strangers and distant agencies for the common good. Let's hope that we can continue to learn and apply similar lessons (without paying the 2005 tuition) as we face the future together.

Neighbors first and last.

2024 Town Clerk/Tax Collector Report

I would like to take the opportunity to list some of the services that the Alstead Town Clerk/Tax Collector's office provides.

We are responsible for collecting property taxes. For those unable to pay all their taxes at once please note that any payment, even if not the full amount due, will reduce the interest to be paid.

We register and title motor vehicles, trailers and boats, and process dog licenses. We use a scanner to scan your old registrations and speed up entry time. We also utilize a "topaz" to capture your signature, which speeds up the process for multiple registrations. *Please note that bringing in your old registration and driver's license is required by state law*.

As of December 2024, the Town Clerk's office can now issue Veteran and Antique Plates for new registrations with the proper documentation. Prior to this, customers were required to start the process at the Town Clerk's office and then go to a DMV office to complete the transaction.

We complete marriage license applications and process birth, marriage, divorce, and death certificates. We also file wetland permit applications and pole licenses. As election officials, we accept voter registration forms, mail absentee ballots, prepare the town ballot and administer the oath of office to any newly elected or appointed Town Official. Our office also provides Notary Public services.

We accept credit card and debit card payments for auto registrations and dog licenses in the office. Please note that there will be a third-party processing fee associated with card payments.

There is the option of renewing your registration(s) and/or dog license(s) on our website www.alstead.nh.org. Property Taxes are also payable on-line by either ACH or Credit Card. To do this, go to the Town of Alstead website (home page), scroll down, and select the appropriate icon and follow the step-by-step instructions.









Please be sure to <u>either</u> make out your check to the Town of Alstead for vehicle registration and print out the confirmation <u>or</u> pay the Town by ACH or Credit Card. If paying by check, mail the confirmation in with your check and keep a copy for yourself until you receive your registration in the mail. Registrations can be renewed up to four months in advance.

As always, if you wish to do renew your vehicle or pay your taxes in person, we are here for you!

It will soon be time to renew your dog licenses for 2025 (2024 licenses will expire on April 30th). Beginning June 1st, a \$1.00 per month late fee is assessed. *Please note that Dog Licensing is required by State Law (RSA 466:1)*

Please visit our website <u>www.alstead.nh.org</u> and go to the Town Clerk section for more detailed information as well as various printable forms.

In February 2023, the office became an Off Highway Recreational Vehicle (OHRV) Registration Agent.

This enables us to register snowmobiles, ATV's/UTV's and dirt bikes.

Please bring in your vehicle information when you come in to register your OHRV. You must also present a valid driver's license or non-driver photo ID issued by the Division of Motor Vehicles. We accept cash or checks as payment for these registrations.

The office hours are Monday and Thursday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 pm, Tuesday from 8:00 am to 7:00 pm (4:00 pm -7:00 pm by appointment), and Wednesday from 8:00 am to 12:00 pm unless posted otherwise. If we close the office during these hours, we will post this information ahead of time at the town office and on the Town of Alstead website (home page).

For everyone's safety, the office may be closed during inclement weather, if you are unsure or have any questions, please call the office at 603-835-2242.

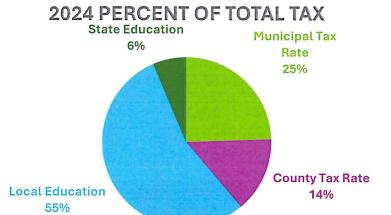

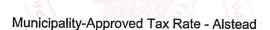

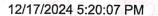

Moderator's 2024 Annual Report

The year of 2024 was a very busy year for voting. We experienced a Presidential Primary, a Deliberative Session, a Town and School Voting, a New Hampshire State Primary and a General Election. What happens to the votes and the ballots? Here we go, behind the scenes. Election procedures are very carefully created and monitored by the office of the NH Secretary of State.

For a registered Voter the first stop in the voting process is the check-in book: The Checklist, which is created and updated by the Supervisors of the Checklist in accordance with schedules and methods established by the NH Secretary of State. The people checking in the voters are the Inspectors of Elections. They are appointed for a two-year term and work according to procedures established by the NH Secretary of State following the election laws of the State.

The blank ballot handed each Voter for a state or federal election has been sent by the Office of the Secretary of State. Ballots for Town and School voting are created within the Town and School District. All blank ballots are counted before voting day and their number recorded. This begins the chain of forms to be completed and submitted at the end of each election.

Voting completed; the Voter stops at the desk of the Town Clerk to be checked off that list. The next stop for the Voter is to hand the ballot to the Moderator. Both of these stops are defined by law for hand count towns.

During the day of voting for state and federal events we are very likely to be visited by a representative from the Office of the NH Attorney General. This representative completes an extensive checklist as to our compliance with State regulations. The category for which we always receive a negative mark is on the availability and sufficiency of our parking!

Following the voting the Moderator records the number of blank ballots with which we started the day, numbers of ballots used during the voting, numbers of ballots voted through absentee voting, numbers of spoiled ballots, numbers of ballots left over at the end of the voting session. This is part of the reconciliation process to be reported to the Office of the Secretary of State.

When the polls close the counting begins. Usually about 25 counters have responded to the request to count. I am extremely grateful for the dedication, careful work, and good cheer of the Vote Counters. Our process is very carefully detailed, as the numbers of ballots cast must match up with the recorded number of voters checked in on the checklist. Vote Counters work in pairs. Within each batch of 50 ballots counted we record the numbers cast for each candidate as well as overvotes (voting for more than the indicated number per office), undervotes (wherein no vote is cast for a candidate) and the number of write-ins and this total must add up to the number 50 for each office or issue being examined by the voting pair. In this way we are secure in knowing that we have documented every vote on every ballot. I as Moderator record all results in each batch of 50, eventually creating the total results.

While the Vote Counters are counting, the Supervisors of the Checklist and the Town Clerk and Deputy Town Clerk reconcile the check-in and check-out books, making sure their numbers match for all categories. They document numbers of in-person voters, absentee voters and, during a primary, numbers voting for each party. The Supervisors' and Clerk's reconciliation must match with the Moderator's reconciliation of ballots cast. We are not finished until we are satisfied that it does.

As soon as all votes have been recorded and necessary forms completed on the night of voting, the voting results for the state and general elections are driven by an Alstead police officer to State Police Headquarters C in Keene. A New Hampshire State Trooper transports collected results from Keene to Concord to the office of the Secretary of State where the final statewide vote is recorded that night.

On the night of March voting day the school district results are transmitted by fax by the Town Clerk to the Fall Mountain School District Supervisory Union. The Town Clerk transmits results of school and town votes and elections to news organizations and posts results of the voting on the big interior window in the lobby of the Town Office Building.

For every election the marked and unmarked ballots are securely sealed with a specific manner and red tape according to the instructions of the Secretary of State. The ballots are stored with the Alstead Town Clerk. Following all voting event additional forms are completed, signed and transmitted. Results of the voting are posted on the Town website.

The New Hampshire Secretary of State provides extensive guidance and many training sessions before voting and is always available for questions throughout the voting day. The New Hampshire Municipal Association provides training and guidance for all Town and School voting and elections.

And wait, there is more! The Town Clerk and the Supervisors of the Checklist also have very particular duties, schedules, processes and procedures to follow to ensure accurate voting and voter records throughout the year.

I hope that this telling provides you, the Voter, with a clear understanding of how it works. Many people are dedicated to the process of voting and to ensuring that every vote counts. I am grateful to all of them, and to you, the Voter, for participating.

Despite our strong success with hand counting, it may be time to change. The Town of Alstead has an unusual opportunity to move to a new phase of counting using a scanning tabulator system. On the 2025 ballot is a petitioned warrant article asking the voters of the Town of Alstead, pursuant to RSA 656:40, to permit the use of an electronic ballot counting device in our town and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4500 for the VotingWorks hardware and initial service fee, to be raised by taxation. The remaining \$3500 cost of the hardware would be billed by VotingWorks directly to the NH Secretary of State under a one-time program available through June 30, 2026. Alstead would enter a 5-year contract with VotingWorks, at a cost of \$500 annual service fee and \$500 per election held in each year.

The reasons are many: time, the cost of time, a diminishing pool of vote counters, concern for safety in winter weather and succession planning. Each year we budget about \$2000 per voting event for the preparation for a hand-count, the counting, and the final compilation and reporting of results. In the presidential election year of 2024 which had 4 voting events we budgeted \$8145 for hand counting alone.

VotingWorks has met all the NH standards for tabulator operation and security and exceeds Federal standards for voting security. Paper ballots are fed by the voter into the scanner, which scans and records in 4 seconds. It is *very important* to note that the VotingWorks system cannot in any way connect with the internet and that its code is available on their website. Final reports are efficiently generated. Please take a look at their website, Voting.Works.

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One of the documents the Moderator, Town Clerk and Supervisors of the checklist complete for the Secretary of State is the *Names on the Checklist*. The information in the following chart is taken from the *Names on the Checklist* reports for 2024.

Details of Voting Events, Alstead 2024

Presidential Primary - January 23, 2024

Candidates: 21 Democratic, 24 Republican

Absentee ballots: 18 voting Republican, 15 voting Democratic

Undeclared casting ballots for Republican = 262 Undeclared casting ballots for Democratic = 46

Democratic ballots cast: 213. Republican ballots cast: 469

Total ballots cast: 682. Voter participation: 51.4% Twenty-four people counted votes. Counting was done before 8. Final tabulation, reconciliation and reports complete at 10 pm.

Deliberative Session - February 3, 2024 - 10 am start

60 voters at the meeting, 10 guests in attendance. Voter participation: 5%

By 2 pm 35 voters remained. The meeting ended at 3 pm, the voters remaining having moved to reconsider article 2 (the budget) and then reducing it. Thus 3% of Alstead voters determine the size of the budget for the year, and this was the budget on which people voted on March 12.

Town/School Voting - March 12, 2024

A sunny day! Unlike last year (2023) we had no drama with the weather, and we were all grateful.

Town and School voting involves completing 4 separate ballots: elections and ballots for both the Town of Alstead and the Fall Mountain Regional School District.

405 voters came to the polls to cast ballots and 14 people voted by absentee ballot, for a Total voters: 419. Voter participation: 32% Twenty people helped with counting of the 4 ballots. This took 2.75 hours. Final tabulation, reconciliation and reports complete at 11 pm.

NH State Primary - September 10, 2024

Absentee ballots: 10 voting Republican, 23 voting Democratic

Undeclared casting ballots for Republican = 64 Undeclared casting ballots for Democratic = 107

Democratic ballots cast: 245 Republican ballots cast: 204

Total ballots cast: 449. Voter participation: 34%.

Seventeen people helped with counting the ballots, finishing by 9 pm. Final tabulation, reconciliation and reports complete at 10:45 pm.

General Election - November 5, 2024

In the General Election 1070 people voted in person and 150 voted absentee giving a total of 1220 voters casting ballots. This is a voter turnout of 82%. Very high! The New Hampshire turnout on 11/5/2024 was 73%. Thirty-three people helped to count ballots. Most counting was completed by 9 pm. Final tabulation, reconciliation and reports complete at 10:30 pm.

**** **** **** ***

There were four voting periods in 2024 and I would like to acknowledge the people who volunteered to count the ballots this year. This is such a wonderful service that these people give to the Town of Alstead. It is work that is done cheerfully, carefully, efficiently despite the night time hour and possibly stormy weather.

2024 Alstead Highway Department Annual Report

I would like to start by thanking the Highway Department crew for their dedication and hard work during the year. Due to the size of our crew, many long days and nights are endured throughout the year. This department would not be able to accomplish the things we do every year, without this dedicated team of individuals. Thank you again!

The beginning of 2024 came in like a lamb and continued like this through the winter. This is great because it reduces the amount of mud that we must deal with in the spring. However, this causes its own set of problems when you try to plow gravel roads that are not frozen. Trying to prevent the plow from digging in constantly makes for long days and nights of plowing.

In the spring we were able to purchase a box blade and offset flail mower using a special one-time Highway Block Grant. The flail mower was used at Bragg Lane to reclaim the field that had been overrun by vegetation. The mower was also used for roadside mowing this year. With some funds remaining in the special block grant, the town purchased a large tire changer and wheel balancing machine. These pieces of equipment will allow the Highway Department to change large tires in-house, this will save the town money by not having to send tires out to have them done.

In April, Bazin Brothers won the bid and was awarded the Resurfacing Projects Contract for the sum of \$259,510.40. The resurfacing projects consisted of milling and paving of Homestead, Drewsville, and North Roads, as well as paving an apron on Cobb Hill. After the projects were finished, center lines and fog lines were added to the roads that were paved. While Poirier Guidelines was in town, we had them add lines to Gilsum Mine Road. Unfortunately, due to funding we could only add lines to that one road.

Due to the drought, we were able to take care of many culverts in need of replacing. This depleted much of our reserves, luckily, we were able to use \$38,488.00 of ARPA funds to replace some of our stock.

In the fall, the State of New Hampshire red listed Comstock Road Bridge. Due to quick actions by the Highway Department, the bridge was re-decked with new timbers and was quickly taken off the red list for a few more years. When that project was finished, we then cleaned out the grader shed and added a mezzanine. This project was done using donated materials. The mezzanine will provide us with about 350 square feet of additional storage space.

In closing, I would like to thank the community for their continued support over the last year.

2024 ALSTEAD POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

For the last several years we have continued an upward trend in calls for service. We had 862 in 2022, 973 in 2023, and 1070 in 2024. We welcome the many new residents to our town!

Our top calls for service (CFS) for 2024 are as follows:

Some of these calls for service take only a few minutes, but many of them take hours, days, weeks, or months to conclude, including some that require time in court. Corporal Underwood, part-time Officer Jonah Merkle, Penny Gendron and myself handle these calls as we are available. In addition to our 1070 calls for service, our department also initiated 381 Motor Vehicle Stops. We responded to approximately 85% of all calls for service that occurred in Alstead in 2024. NHSP or other agencies covered the balance.

The police department's community outreach programs continue to be very successful. Our Office Administrator Penny Gendron and Corporal Wendy Underwood's yearly coordination of these initiatives are enjoyed by all who come out and participate. Some of these include the bi-annual Drug Takeback Day, Trunk or Treat (in 2024, 10 plus vehicles were decorated and the event was attended by approximately 150 children and their families), and the annual Christmas Tree Lighting (with the accompanying activities). Thank you to all of the community members who come out in all kinds of weather to help and/or participate in these events.

The Alstead Police Department provides many services to town residents. Among these are Fingerprinting, Car Seat Fitting/Evaluation, and Bicycle Helmet Fitting. We still have a few free bicycle helmets left. We can confidentially provide information to contact outside resources for mental health, welfare, domestic violence victim support, and others. If you have any questions or would like more information about these and other services please call 603-835-6277. All calls and meetings with our department are confidential.

To maintain our certifications and enhance our skills, we participated in multiple training sessions throughout the year. Wendy, Jonah and I completed our mandatory training with NH Police Standards and Training Council including; Firearms, Use of Force, the "3x2s" (2 hours each of Implicit Bias, Ethics, De-escalation) and "Prioritizing Officer Mental Health Wellness". Wendy also participated in NCJTC "Minimal Facts Gathering", DHART "Ground Safety Course", National Child Passenger Safety "Car Seat Detective", NH Attorney General's "Response to Adult Sexual Assault Cases", PRI Management Group

"Report Writing 102", NHPSTC "Human Trafficking 101" and "No Buyer=No Victim", and Granite State Children's Alliance "Minimal Facts for First Responders", Primex "Bullying and Cyberbullying Prevention for Schools".

Penny completed these courses: Criminal Justice Information Services; Security and Privacy Training, Primex "Calming the Storm: How to De-Escalate Emotionally Charged Encounters" and "Ethics and Code of Conduct, PRI Management Group "Releasing and Redacting Law Enforcement Records" and "Report Writing 102".

I attended courses: UNH Safety Symposium "Finding Resilience Through Crisis", NHPSTC "Prioritizing Officer Mental Health Wellness and Resilience", PRI "Releasing and Redacting Law Enforcement Records", ATF Federal Firearms Offenses Training, Primex "Handling Conflict", "Social Media Ethics", "Accident Investigation: Preventing Injuries and Improving Safety in the Workplace", and "Interpersonal Communication Skills".

A huge thank you to our Highway Department, Ambulance and Fire Departments, our mutual aid departments; Cheshire County Sheriff's Office, Walpole and Marlow Police Departments, and the NH State Police who cover Alstead when we are not on duty. In addition, I would like to thank our select board members who have continued to support our department goals for this past year. Many other town employees assist all residents and us throughout the year. It is impossible to thank everyone but I wanted to give a shout out to Town Administrator Misty Gratacos, Town Clerk/Tax Collector Julie Bacon and Administrative Assistant to the select board Sharon lozzo, Thank you!

A very special recognition and congratulations to Administrative Assistant Penny Gendron who has been working for the police department for 10 years this March 2025. She has been an invaluable asset to the town, the department, and to me. Penny cares so much for Alstead and the Community that she works tirelessly all hours of the day and night to help the residents of our town through her general availability and license as a Justice of the Peace. Whether she is signing an arrest Warrant after hours, responding to a request for assistance through social media, or conducting marriage ceremonies in the Gazebo, Penny is there for everyone. 2024 Transfer Station Annual Report

2024 brought some changes to the Alstead Transfer Station. Jesse Moore was hired to oversee operations. You probably already know Jesse in his role as Alstead Ambulance Chief. Welcome aboard Jesse! You may have also noticed the bright color uniforms which provide a measure of safety to our employees. A grid rail was also installed around the compactor to improve safety. Training (CPR, AED, blood borne pathogens) as well as policies and procedures updates have been a priority.

Revenue for 2024 amounted to \$89,839.98 which is down \$8,693 from 2023 revenue of \$98,533.44. Transfer Station revenue is comprised of 3 categories:

- 1) Langdon contributes to the operational cost of running the Transfer Station. In 2022, Langdon paid \$45,500, in 2023 \$56,000 and a then a new formula based on population was developed, resulting in \$43,398.59 Langdon cost share for 2024.
- 2) External income from recycling commodities equaled \$10,004.83
- 3) Fees paid by resident for disposal of Construction & Demo, tires, fluorescent bulbs, electronics totaled \$36,436.56

OPERATIONS Expenses = \$90,588 in 2024. This includes wages for employees, uniforms, phone, training, supplies, equipment rental and repairs, building & grounds expenses. Operations expenses are up \$8,248 in 2024 over 2023.

Expenses for the SANITATION side of business totaled \$137,070 an increase of \$7,374 over 2023. The three largest expenses for Sanitation are:

Municipal Solid Waste (MSW) \$83,317.68 Construction and Demolition (C&D) \$9,582.24 Trucking \$36,783

MSW - The compactors were emptied 83 times in 2024 with a total weight of 771.5 tons of waste by Ruggerio. The rate charged is \$108 per ton resulting in a cost of \$83,317.68 for processing the waste. Ruggerio also charges each time they haul the compactor. The rate was \$250 start of 2024 and increased to \$275 midyear. Trucking fees for MSW equal \$21,500. MSW total expense = \$104,817.68.

C&D - The C&D container was hauled and emptied 21 times in 2024 for a total weight of 88.7 tons. Rate of \$108 equals \$9,582.84 expense for disposal and \$5,550 for trucking. C&D total expense = \$15,132.84.

Trucking – In addition to the expense of trucking MSW and C&D, Alstead pays Ruggerio to haul Metal \$4,675 and Paper \$3,550.

Alstead disposed of material from the Comstock bridge project, bringing it to Ruggerio via town owned vehicle. Fee for disposal of 8.13 tons at \$160 = \$1,300.80.

Additional disposal expenses include Hazardous Waste \$400, Glass \$1,387.75, Bulbs \$107.53, Tires \$1,294, Electronics \$1,439.68, Freon \$824, and Paper \$457.30

Let's talk about recycling....

There was a time when collecting and baling plastic could produce income. Not so much anymore. It was determined that collecting plastic in Alstead is labor intensive, costly, and not as environmentally friendly as once thought. This resulted in a policy change to plastic collection starting January 1, 2025. Plastic will no longer be collected separately, and should be disposed of with your regular waste.

This only applies to plastics. Several other items make both financial and environmental sense to collect and recycle. Please continue to separate your cardboard, aluminum cans, glass, and paperboard.

The Selectmen and Town employees endeavor to be good stewards of taxpayer money and act in the best interest of residents. Decisions are based on feasibility, economics, safety, and environmental impact.

Let's all do our part to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle!

Alstead OEM Annual Report

This year presented numerous challenges working through the issues identified in the Infrastructure and Personnel Assessment Questionnaire done last year.

Infrastructure and Personnel needs continue to be of great concern.

Maintenance requirements on vital equipment and infrastructure were identified and solutions were found, but work within some areas remains.

Capital equipment in some agencies shows its age and a serious conversation concerning the future levels of some services is warranted. Extremes in weather, such as extended periods of rain or drought, major areas of landslides and erosions, bitter cold and intense hot spells continue to be areas of concern.

We have begun working with the school district looking at possibilities for an Emergency Shelter. Funding for emergency food supplies, emergency cots, and such is non-existent. FEMA grant monies are competitive based, and we are extremely low on the list, even when our needs are clearly demonstrated. Plans are underway to seek alternative revenue sources along with common interest coalitions blending resources for emergencies. One big need is a dedicated Emergency Operations Center. A plan for a makeshift EOC is in place.

Much work remains.

ALSTEAD HISTORICAL SOCIETY 2024 Annual Report

2024 was another very productive year for the Alstead Historical Society. We were fortunate to have Catherine Jahos and Linda (Bellows) Roller join us on Thursdays at our office in the municipal building. Historic materials and items for the museum continue to be donated and have to be recorded, sorted and filed. Linda Roller was especially helpful in researching ancestorial information for people's requests.

The flagpole, light, stone posts and chain were replaced in front of the Alstead Historical Museum. These items were destroyed by an automobile in the winter of 2023/2024.

The steeple on the Maybelle Still Memorial Building (AHS Museum) was painted in October, 2024, with some rotten areas found and repainted in the process. Also, the vent slats in the gable end vent were replaced and painted.

The museum was open on Memorial Day, the 2nd and 4th Sunday's, June thru September and Columbus Day from 1:00 - 4:00 PM. We had 59 visitors from 18 states and 7 New Hampshire towns.

At our annual meeting in April, we welcomed Joy Nalevanko onto our Board of Trustees.

We hosted two Humanities To Go Programs in 2024. In April, Steve Taylor presented "New Hampshire's Long, Love, Hate Relationship With Its Agricultural Farms". There were 39 people in attendance, In November, Jeff Warner presented "Range the Wild Woods Over – Loggers songs and stories", with 28 people in attendance.

Alstead Historical Society donated \$400.00 to help students at Vilas Middle School participate in the American Heritage Tour to Washington DC, Gettysburg, VA and Philadelphia.

Two large mineral specimens were found at the Shedd Porter Library and given to the Historical Society. These samples contain quartz, beryl, mica and feldspar and are now on display at our museum. These two items probably given to the AHS when it was located in the basement of the library in the 1940's and 1950's.

Mark Mastrocinque has joined the historical society and has volunteered to digitalize our tapes, photo's, and records onto CD's and has been making great progress on what will be a long process because of the volume of material the Alstead Historical Society has.

Heather Gendron, Gayle Bellows and Mark Mastrocinque have organized a group of Alstead's native citizens 80's and 90's in age, to be recorded talking about their memories, and changes that have occurred in their lifetimes. This group has met two times and have covered a number of topics. We plan to continue this program in 2025.

We were able to produce only two issues of the "Alstead Vintage Times" during 2024. It is with great sadness that we experienced a sudden decline in the health and the passing

of Peg Sutcliffe. Peg was a very active member of the Alstead Historical Society for many years. She served as a Trustee and became the Editor of the Alstead Vintage Times at its exception in 2018. It was because of her great talent as a writer and artist that everyone got to enjoy the articles in the Vintage Times, which she produced over the past seven years. We all appreciated Peg/s dedication to the Vintage Times.

We are forming a committee to be able to continue publishing the Alstead Vintage Times. Please bear with us as we endeavor to fill the large void created by Peg's passing.

We created an exhibit of a Christmas Tree in the year 1908 and had it on display in the lobby of the Municipal Building for all to enjoy.

CEMETERY COMMISSION 2024 Annual Report

Maintenance and upkeep of our cemeteries was a little less difficult this year than in 2023 as we had less rain, but the grass continued to grow at a rate that was manageable, thanks to Jodi Kercewich and Shaena Hakey for a job well done.

Twenty small headstones at Alstead Center Cemetery and eight medium size headstones at Mapleside Cemetery were straightened and reset. Four flat ground grave markers at Pine Grove Cemetery and two flat ground grave markers at West Cemetery were uncovered, lifted and reset along with a number of corner stones. One large monument in Morningside Cemetery was straightened and reset by Keene Monument Company in Keene, New Hampshire.

Russell Tree Service of Alstead was hired to cut a large ash tree near the stone wall along route 123 and to trim limbs on an oak tree and several maple trees at West Cemetery in East Alstead.

At a meeting February 27, 2024, we agreed to establish the following rates and conditions for the purchase of burial plots in the Alstead Cemeteries effective March 1, 2024.

- 1 Single burial plot 4' x 11' in size \$400.00
 - A This includes one cremation burial.
 - B Or one full casket burial
 - C When cremation burial is chosen, it is allowed to have four additional Cremation burials in said plot at \$100.00 per cremation internment.
 - D The additional \$100.00 fees will be added to the original \$400.00 Cemetery trust fund.
- 2 Double Burial plot 8' x 11' in size \$800.00
 - A This allows for two full casket burials.
 - B Or one casket burial and up to five cremation burials.
 - C Additional fees same as C and D for single plot.
- 3 Corner stone markers required within six (6) months of lot purchase, installation free.
- 4 Fee for digging and restoring lot for cremation internment. \$200.00

When a cemetery plot is purchased, a new cemetery trust fund is established with interest from that fund to be used to care for cemeteries. The annual interest from all cemetery trust funds is paid to the town of Alstead to offset a portion of the annual cemetery budget. For the year 2024 that amount was \$17,350.98. Cemetery lots may be acquired by contracting Jodi Kercewich at 603-209-3954.

Vilas Pool Park is a cherished town and state treasure. Built between 1925 and 1926, it was generously gifted to the town of Alstead by Charles Vilas, a native of Alstead and philanthropist. The park is funded by grants, an endowment left by Mr. Vilas, and generous donations from community members like you. In 2022, Vilas Pool Park was added to the NH State Register of Historic Places.

The park features a variety of recreational areas, including a carillon, picnic areas, a man-made pool, fireplaces, swimming, boating, and a pavilion available for events. For nearly a century, Vilas Pool Park has been a gathering place for the community, where neighbors, friends, and families can come to enjoy nature and the simple pleasures of life.

The 2024 season at Vilas Pool Park started strong with the renovation of the historic "snack shack", funded by a Moose Plate grant from the NH Division of Historical Resources. The snack shack historically served as a place to grab a little nosh while enjoying the park, but over the years had become quite dilapidated. Recognizing its historic significance, the committee oversaw a full refurbishment inside and out, as nearly all aspects of the building needed repair to be saved. Today, the snack shack looks better than ever, and the committee hopes to offer refreshments from it in the coming years.

In addition to the renovations, a great deal of clean up was necessary due to flooding from prior years. This took place throughout most of the summer while the park remained open to the public. The committee was also able to replace the Swan Boat that was lost last year and purchased a side-by-side UTV to assist with boat removal, grounds care, and transportation for those who are unable to navigate some of the property's hilly and rocky terrain.

The park continues to be a popular venue for folks to celebrate all sorts of occasions. Some of the events we hosted this year included: The Vilas 8th grade grad dance, the Alstead Ambulance award dinner, several baby showers, two weddings, many family picnics, The Boy Scouts camped out overnight, The Girl Scouts also had their own campout, there was a memorial service, and many birthday parties including for our own Steve Blake, longtime Vilas Pool supporter and Committee Member.

Looking ahead to 2025, the committee is considering bringing back Vilas Pool Day and other family events to the park. Thank you for your continued support and for sharing your love of this historic treasure with all of us.

2024 Annual Town Report Alstead Conservation Commission

The Conservation Commission is in transition, and we are looking for new members. We welcomed a new commissioner this fall, Andi Johnson.

Trails – The commission and Bill Blaiklock have completed the Town Forest Trail, named the Newell Pond Woods Trail. Commissioners and friends hiked the 1.5 mile trail in May with Bill. He provided signage to guide hikers.

See Bill's Facebook page, Friends of Alstead Trails, for a map (look in **Featured**) and visitors' comments.

In 2025, we are looking forward to more trail activity at Wellman Pond off Gilsum Mine Road.

Lake Warren – The commissioners attended two site walks and a hearing to address ongoing problems, at the lake, with Pine Cliff Road and the state boat landing. The commission also provided to some lake abutters information about plantings to help control erosion.

Road Clean-up – Many "Thank-You's" go out to those who signed up and showed up Saturday, April 27, 2024, to remove trash from our roadsides. Blue Bags were distributed by the re-use center and were collected by Alstead's road crew. Alstead's police department issued updated safety guidelines for this activity.

Orchard Hill School – The commission is pleased to be able to contribute again to the Orchard Hill School summer program for children. We donated two scholarships to Alstead children to attend the program.

Easements – The commission monitored easements in the fall. We contact the owner to make site visits and take walks to check for conditions. We are required to report findings to state organization, as noted here: the New

Hampshire Society for Protection of Forests (NHSPF).

An exception is at Wellman Pond (the Gardener Easement), which is reported to the Conservation Land Stewardship Program.

NOTE: We need a steward or designated person to monitor the easement annually. A partial monitoring was done in 2022 by a representative from the CLIP program.

The latest version of the <u>Conservation Land Stewardship Guide for Municipal LCIP Properties</u> is available on their website, https://www.clsp.nh.gov/lcip-municipalities/municipal-guide. It is a great resource for both municipal LCIP Property stewards and LCIP conservation easement landowners. *Check it out!*

Forestry workshop – The Cheshire County Conservation District (CCCD) offers workshops to staff and the public. A commissioner attended one held in summer 2024 on Pratt Road at a logging site, demonstrating damages to the landscape due to poorly logged activity.

SHEDD-PORTER MEMORIAL LIBRARY Town Report 2024

2024 was a great year for Shedd-Porter Memorial Library! I am always happy to report on the events of this busy year:

- Patrons visited Shedd-Porter over 10,000 times in 2024.
- We welcomed 63 new patrons to the library.
- 17,682 items circulated throughout the community.
- Shedd-Porter is pleased to participate in resource-sharing with other NH public libraries. In 2024, the NH Inter-Library Loan system delivered 770 items to us, while we lent 992 items to other libraries throughout the state.
- We added 1,035 new items to our shelves.
- By using the library instead of purchasing materials, patrons saved over \$113,000.
- Our public access computers were used over 400 times, while many more patrons made use of our free wifi. There is no charge to use our computers many people use them to print! Our printing fees are \$.20 per page for b/w and \$.50 for color.

Programs at Shedd-Porter are an important part of our mission. They are always free to the public. We welcome you! For area youth, we host Storytimes on Thursdays at 11:30 am. This fun time is geared towards preschool children. On Fridays our creativity flows during Crafternoons at 3:30pm. This event is geared toward elementary-aged children. All children and their caregivers are welcome to join in!

Programming at Shedd-Porter extends as outreach into our local schools. I love leading Storytimes and bringing books to share to both Sarah Porter School and Alstead Primary School monthly. We are happy to provide books for a book club at Fall Mountain Regional High School through our Inter-Library Loan system.

Summer is my favorite time of year at Shedd-Porter, and I'm excited to tell you about 2024 highlights of the Marion Holmes Summer Reading Club! Our theme was Adventure Begins at your Library! Adventure we did. I am so grateful to the Holmes family for continuing to financially support this program. We hosted eight programs over six weeks this past summer where we read, learned, and created!

2024 was also exciting because we accomplished an important renovation of the downstairs restroom. We are thrilled and grateful for grants from the Mascoma Foundation as well as many donations large and small from individuals. So many community members contributed to this effort! It was wonderful to see this project through to completion. Many patrons have commented on the spectacular

A Marvelous Change

The Shedd-Porter Memorial Library has a phenomenal new restroom! After generations of having a restroom squeezed into a tiny closet space in the corner of a dark, unpleasant and frightening room we now have a clean and charming restroom area for our patrons.

The impact of this renovation cannot be overstated. The patrons' experience at Shedd-Porter is transformed. Children are no longer scared to enter a dark, ominous room. They are not scared of a loud pumping system. People have privacy in the bathroom. Children can access a sink, and caregivers can change a baby. Adults have room to move around. Families stay at the library longer. We have received so much enthusiastic feedback on the renovation. We have heard "You all did a great job on the bathroom!" "The bathroom looks great!" to "Thank you!" and "The little sink is so cute!" Staff is also thrilled. Everyone notices and the praise is unanimous. We are so very grateful.

Many monetary contributions funded this project. The Shedd-Porter Memorial Library is so thankful for the \$5000 grant from the Mascoma Bank Foundation specifically for the renovation. Patrons and donors wrote checks and dropped coins into our collection jar. Each contribution, whether a penny or many dollar bills, helped make this significant change and was accepted with gratitude.

Bellows Construction LLC provided an inspiring re-imagination of what the space could be and then made it a reality, a magical transformation. We were blessed by having the additional magical support of Matt Beam Plumbing and Heating and J.A. Allen and Son Electric. Altogether, they put on a brilliant show.

There are so many new upgrades! A new toilet has been reoriented to better fit the small space. A new pumping mechanism is now sequestered behind a wall and is much quieter than the old model. The water closet walls were painted a warm cream color. A period appropriate lock (operable from outside in an emergency) ensures privacy, a new feature for our restroom. The old and stained sink was removed and two new sinks --adult and child levels-- are installed outside of the water closet. A new hot water heater now produces warm water. A lit mirror sparkles above the sinks. New woodwork and lighting above the sinks is beautiful and helps conceal the pipes. The once dark brown and stained walls of the outer room have been painted a warm cream color while preserving the historic painted-on wainscoting. The ductwork has been painted, further disguising any pipes across the ceiling. A changing table is now in place on one wall. A motion sensor light gives immediate light to anyone entering. A utility sink was installed in the adjacent boiler room; this allows programming staff to clean up after crafts and the cleaning crew to properly dispose of cleaning water. The change is stupendous!

The Shedd-Porter Memorial Library is at the heart of the communities of Alstead and Langdon, and affects the lives of the patrons in every way that a person lives within a community. Individuals use the Library for literacy, knowledge and creative stimulation. Individuals use the Library for research in all aspects of contemporary life: environment, health needs, housing and technology. The computers and printers in the Library give individuals access to health and human services and tax preparation. The Library provides a venue for people to come together twice a month for discussion and social interaction.

Children and families of our communities love our friendly children's room; a place to play, weekly craft programs, reading challenges, and the very well attended Marion Holmes Summer Reading Program. Having a functioning, comfortable, charming, sanitary and secure restroom ensures that the Library cares for its patrons needs.

The Shedd-Porter Memorial Library mission to welcome the public requires that we keep up with critical infrastructure. The state of our previous restroom facilities was severely lacking. As the trustees, staff, and the community navigate into Shedd-Porter's second century, modernization and updates must occur. At the same time we must remain true to to the beauty and character of our historic building. This project contributes to this effort, helping to ensure this library stays vibrant and relevant well into the future.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

2023 brought an increase of nearly 10% of calls. We were hit again with flooding, impacting numerous roads and buildings. One subject was rescued from a vehicle caught in the flood waters. It was a very quiet brush fire season, due to significant precipitation over the season. Firefighters made a strong impact with their initial attack on the one structure fire in town this year. Although the barn and the attached L were destroyed, the fire was stopped before destroying the main house. Members attended live burn forestry training in both Goshen and Charlestown. Eversouce brought their electrical utility trailer for a state accredited training in town. Swift water rescue awareness training was instructed by Rescue Inc, members were able to participate in hands-on training if they desired. Members took part in a CPR, AED, and Stop the Bleed training. Fire prevention week allowed members to visit the Alstead Primary School to educate children on fire safety and prevention.

The Alstead Fire Department Apparatus is Listed Below Followed by Where is it Housed:

Engine 1- Manufactured in 2016- HME Ahrens-Fox. This unit carries 1000 gallons of water with a 1500 gallons-per-minute pump, as well as all of our extrication equipment. It is housed at the village station.

Engine 3- Manufactured in 2000- Peirce. Carries 1000 gallons of water with a 1250 gallons-per-minute pump, as well as hand tools, hose, and equipment. It is housed at the East Station.

Tanker 1- Manufactured in 2007- International chassis, body by Valley Fire Equipment. This unit carries 3000 gallons of water, with a 500 gallons-per-minute pump. It is housed in the East Station.

Brush 1- Manufactured in 1967- Kaiser Jeep M715 (military 5/4 pickup). This unit carries 200 gallons of water, assorted forestry hand tools, back pack pumps, and 2 back pack leaf blowers. This unit also pulls a trailer, complete with a portable pump and extra hose. Brush 1 is on loan from the State of New Hampshire, Division of Forest and Lands under the FEPP program. It is insured and maintained by the town, and registered to the state. This truck is housed in the East Station.

UTV 1- Manufactured in 2019- Polaris Ranger 900, complete with a forestry/rescue slide in unit. This unit is equipped with 70 gallons of water and a portable pump, as well as the potential to carry a stokes for an off road rescue. We have outfitted this unit with tracks for winter time use. This apparatus is housed at the East Station.

We would like to once again remind residents to have house numbers, visible from the road. The lack of visible numbers results in a delay of response in an emergency. If we cannot find your house, we cannot find you.

Permits are required, by law, when burning with no snow cover (100' radius). Burning treated (painted or stained) wood, construction debris, wood larger than 5" in diameter, plywood, particle board, household trash, shingles, tires, etc., is unlawful and may result in fines and or jail time. To obtain a free permit, or ask questions about burning, please contact:

2024 AMBULANCE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Alstead Ambulance had another record-breaking year, responding to 187 calls for service. This reflects a 5% increase over the previous year. Along with transports to area hospitals and on-scene medical care, this includes public service calls, such as lift assists, welfare checks, and standby at structure fires. Over the past several years, we have seen a steady measured rise in the number of calls.

We had to rely on some mutual aid assistance throughout the year and I would like to thank the Alstead Fire Department, Walpole Fire and EMS, and Cheshire County EMS. A special recognition goes out to Gilsum Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad for their selfless and timely support in the far reaches of East Alstead.

Both of our ambulances have passed the paramedic licensing process with the State of New Hampshire and Cheshire Medical Center. Obtaining this license means that, in most cases, our responders will no longer have to wait for a paramedic from Keene; when needed, calls will have a paramedic on board, thus speeding up advanced life support procedures.

This past December, a number of our EMS personnel braved the mind-numbing cold (22 degrees) to participate in completing a six (6) hour class (outside) on the Fundamentals of Automobile Extrication.

We also completed the federal and state mandated ten (10) hour class in Traffic Incident Management & Responder Safety. There is nothing more important than ensuring all of our responders come home safely from working roadside incidents.

The Town of Alstead now has approximately 22 AEDs located around town. All Town vehicles, buildings, and most businesses within the Alstead limits should have AEDs installed. Please attend one of our classes on how to properly use an AED, if you have not already done so. It is also a good idea to take annual refresher courses.

Some notes of importance for our community to enable EMS to do their jobs more effectively and to serve you and your family better:

- Have house numbers clearly visible from the road.
- Make a separate list of each family member's current medications and supplements and attach them to the refrigerator; this saves precious time on scene.
- Ambulance Department is offering FREE CPR and AED classes to the public throughout the year; please contact a member of the ambulance crew or come see us at our monthly meeting.

Thank you to the Select Board and community members for your support throughout this past year, we look forward to continuing to support you in 2025. Please feel free to contact us for more information on how you can help serve the town of Alstead as a member of the department by attending one of our meetings, we meet the third Wednesday of every month at 6:30 PM at the Village Fire Station.
